Plans set for harbor renovation

Plans are underway for the harbor to be completely rebuilt next fall, probably starting October 1st.

Shoreline Solutions, who has done several other harbors in the area, has been working with us and Cass County to approve the project. Step one was to complete a septic compliance on the property. This has been done and hopefully will be approved by next spring. Several permits and plans will have to be approved by both state and county.

Depending on the final design, we might lose a portion of our boathouse and a few trees will have to come down.

We are very excited and are looking forward to having a safer walkway, possibly larger boat slips, and adjustable docks to accommodate the forever fluctuating water levels of Leech Lake.



The harbor walls have been caving more each year. Anchor cables have slipped, poles are weakening and the original design and installation has not withstood the pressure.

Leech Lake survey report, findings

The following is a summary of the updates (8/31/07 and 10/12/07), which is part of a series of reports the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) sends to Leech Lake area resorts, businesses and others interested in DNR activities on Leech Lake. Large Lake Survey

- The annual Leech Lake fisheries survey began in July and extended until early October.
- Survey work uses shoreline seining (July), trawling (August), experimental gillnets (September), and fall elec-

trofishing (October). Regardless of which method is used, catch rates reflect changes in relative abundance and are therefore not intended to directly determine the population size.

- The summer portion of the Leech Lake survey (seining and trawling) was completed.
- The long-term trawling stations (Fivemile, Goose, and Whipholt) were trawled for a total effort of 100 minutes this year instead of the previous 60 minutes to improve sampling precision.
- Mean catch rate of young-of-year walleyes in bottom trawl hauls was below average at 32.1 fish/hour. We generally do not see large year classes

establish during successive years on our large lakes, and high recruitment during three consecutive years is rare, due primarily to competition and predation among age classes.

- Mean length of age-0 walleyes captured in trawl hauls was almost 6 inches, which bodes well for winter survival and recruitment of these fish. Similarly, fish in the 2006 year class are also growing fast (some are already approaching 12 inches!) and should continue to provide great angling opportunities in the coming years.

Freedom to Breathe provisions

Minnesota Governor Tim Pawlenty signed into law the Freedom to Breathe (FTB) provisions on May 16, 2007, to protect employees and the public from the health hazards of second-hand smoke.



According to the new law, we are required to prohibit smoking inside the lodge, however smoking will be permitted on the deck and the area outside the lodge. Smoking will continue to be permitted in all our cabins.

• Catch rates of age-0 yellow perch (15,051 fish/hour) were well above the average of 9,505 fish/hour, and suggest a suitable forage base is available for walleyes this fall and winter.

Whitefish Kill in Walker Bay

• A whitefish kill occurred in Walker Bay during August 9-11, 2007.

• Lake whitefish (*Coregonus clupeaformis*) are found in many of the deep, cool-water lakes east of the prairie in the northern portions of the state, including Lake Superior. Whitefish require cool, well-oxygenated water in the summertime.

• Because of this requirement, whitefish spend most of their summers feeding on invertebrates and other small fish near the thermocline.

• The thermocline is a "barrier" dividing the epilimnion (less dense, warmer, well-oxygenated water) and the hypolimnion (more dense, colder water with low oxygen concentrations). The hypolimnion is low in oxygen because the thermocline is the extent of sunlight penetration into the water. Without sunlight, photosynthesis by aquatic plants and algae does not occur.

• Summer kills of whitefish and ciscoes happen when fish become "pinched" between excessively warm temperatures in the epilimnion and low oxygen below the thermocline. In most cases the largest individuals are the most susceptible to this type of mortality.

• Whitefish serve as an excellent forage species for walleyes, northern pike, and muskellunge, and also as table fare for human consumption.

• The presence of lake whitefish is an indication of excellent water quality.

• The current state record of 12 lbs. 4.5 oz. was caught in Leech Lake on March 21, 1999.

Gillnet Survey (10/12/07 update)

• Goals of the 2005-2010 Leech Lake Management Plan are to protect and maintain walleye spawning stock, to increase overall walleye abundance, to improve the population size structure, and to establish two good year classes during this five-year period.

• Gillnets are the best tool for monitoring walleye and yellow perch populations, but also provide valuable information on other species, such as ciscoes and northern pike. The annual gillnet survey of the Leech Lake fishery was completed from September 3 through 14, 2007. Management plan goals were based on gillnet catches.

Walleye

• Biomass of mature female walleyes was 1.92 lbs/acre, which is above the management goal of 1.25-1.75 lbs/acre, indicating that plenty of females are available for good natural reproduction.

• The gillnet catch rate of walleyes was 13.1 fish/net. This is the second highest on record (13.4 fish/net in 1988) since standardized annual surveys began in 1983, and well above the 1983-2007 average of 7.5 fish/net.

• Walleyes of all sizes are present in relatively high numbers.

• Both the 2005 and 2006 year classes of walleye are large and will provide excellent angling opportunities well into the future. Based on trawling, the 2007 year class does not appear to be large in number. However, these fish have been growing fast and could exhibit high survival, which in turn may result in the establishment of another good year class.

• All walleye management goals established in the 2005-2010 Leech Lake Management Plan have been met or exceeded, and Leech Lake should provide quality walleye fishing during coming years.

Yellow Perch

• The catch rate of yellow perch in gillnets was 36.8 fish/net and is above the 1983-2007 average of 21.7 fish/net.

• While only 6% of the yellow perch sampled exceeded 10 inches in length, 29% were 8 inches and longer. This is because a large number of smaller perch were produced in recent years and are now recruiting to the gillnets. These fish will continue to grow and reach harvestable sizes into the future.
